After four years of study, research, and observations with the National BUILD initiative in implementing the ELAN Project, Arkansas has moved forward to address racial equity issues creating five goals and a professional development model that would focus on eliminating racial equity disparities in classrooms all across the state.

This will be done by analyzing and using racial equity data and creating a strong statewide racial equity collaborative early childhood system with courageous partners and intentional teamwork.

Racial Equity is the condition that would be achieved if one's racial identity no longer predicted, in a statistical sense, how one fares.

**STEPPING UP TO RACIAL EQUITY IN ARKANSAS**

The Professional Development Racial Equity Model is a professional development model designed to eliminate racial disparities in Arkansas's Early Childhood Education System. The five-step racial equity integration model outlines a progressive professional development plan designed to positively change the behavior of parents, teachers, administrators, staff, board members and legislators.

Beginning with racial equity awareness and conducting with collaborative systems change approach, this racial equity model will move early childhood agencies and organizations from a foundational understanding of racial equity to advanced racial equity competency and proficiency levels that will improve and support the state's vision for eliminating educational disparities.
